

Which is best?

1. The same content is taught at each camp. The staff is different from camp to camp, but all staffers are former campers and are selected for their capacity to teach, not for their performance prowess.
2. Group size, camper age, cost, weather, and travel are family choices.
3. By NCAA rules, no college football coach may attend any summer camp practice or competition on a campus other than the college where he is employed. On the campuses where our camps are conducted, the college coaches are furnished complete rosters of participants, practice schedules, and player contact information. Often unobserved by the campers and their parents, coaches on all campuses watch parts of some practices and attend lectures. They frequently wander among the parents at the late afternoon and evening practices. They are available for office visits with players and their parents. Even so, do not choose any camp for the purpose of exhibiting skills as an audition for a college scholarship! Without helmet and pads, live snap and hold, a game clock, and game situations, you cannot easily show what a college coach wants to visualize ---- you by comparison to his graduating player or in conjunction with his existing age 22 and 23 players on any special teams play.
4. The earlier in the summer you attend camp, the more time you have to prepare for the season ---- assuming you work steadily on the drills and formulate attainable goals.
5. If you play a position in addition to kicking, punting, or snapping, you must develop special teams skills over the entire summer, reaching your peak just before team practice starts in August. You will not get better after that point. Attend camp early.
6. Attending camp with friends or teammates increases the likelihood of productive practices at home.
7. Attending camp far from home may give family members a chance to visit relatives or vacation during the camp days.
8. Encouraging your high school coach to visit practices and lecture sessions will enhance his appreciation of your value to the team and may improve his understanding of special teams plays.
